ON-SITE BUS SERVICE BEGINS MONDAY, FEBRUARY 4

Beginning Monday, February 4, two on-site bus routes at NAL will operate continuously from about 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Planned by the NAL Business Office and its Support Services group, the bus service will answer a need that has developed since many employees began using car pools to and from work. That situation, together with an increasing number of employees being located in the Central Laboratory Building but having work errands back in the Village and in the experimental areas, has changed the traffic pattern on site rapidly in the last few weeks. In addition, the Laboratory is cutting back on its use of government-owned vehicles by 20%. The new bus service is intended to be an aid in keeping work flowing smoothly while continuing energy conservation efforts.

Route 1 - The Village-Cross Gallery Route. This route will start at the Cross Gallery. It will leave from the entrances to the Central Laboratory Building nearest the Auditorium (on the west side of the building when going from the Cross Gallery area, returning on the east side, to give easy access to the loading door of the bus). From the Cross Gallery area it will travel to the Magnet Facility for a pick-up there and at Support Services-Plant Management. It will then go to the Village, stopping at (1) Personnel-Cafeteria, (2) Purchasing-Stock Room, 18 Potawatomi, and (3) at the Curia, 28 Shabbona. The bus will then return to the Cross Gallery, essentially in reverse order of the forward route. The route is planned to take about 20 minutes in each direction.

Route 2 - The Bubble Chamber-Cross Gallery Route. This route will leave the Curia in the Village, 28 Shabbona, at 8:10 a.m. and travel straight to the Cross Gallery, beginning its regular route at 8:20 a.m. (This is to accommodate those employees who car pool to the Village, but work at the Cross Gallery area.) During the rest of the day, this route will begin at the side entrances of the Central Laboratory Building nearest the Auditorium (in the same manner as Route 1). It will then go to the Meson Detector Building. After that, it will cross over the Neutrino line to the Proton experimental area. From there it will proceed to the Bubble Chamber Area. The route will then return in reverse order to the Cross Gallery. Time for this route is expected to be 15 minutes in each direction.

Buses to be used will be the former mail bus and another 20-passenger bus. Drivers will be regular drivers from Support Services.

The bus service and the routes have been planned on a trial basis by Jim Campbell, Director of Business, and his assistant, Jim Finks, and R. Lewandowski, Material Distribution Supervisor, to meet what seem to be obvious stops for such a service. CAREER DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITY FOR NAL EMPLOYEES

A new career development opportunity for NAL employees was announced by Richard A. Carrigan, Director of Personnel Services, on January 24. The plan allows employees interested in improving or modifying their present job status to file this information with the Personnel Office. By filing a Career and Qualification Summary, now available in the Employment Office, employees can list qualifications for a desired position, training received or course work taken related to the desired position, and other pertinent information. This form is then on record when job openings are posted, and the employee's interest may be considered by the Personnel Office. "This does not eliminate competition for positions," said Dr. Carrigan, "but it means that an employee will not be passed by because his interest in a particular job is not known in the Personnel Office."

Having recorded his career interests and intentions, the employee (with the permission of his supervisor) may also be eligible for tuition reimbursement for further education toward his career objective.

Employees may file two career and qualification summary forms, indicating interest in two job areas. The statement remains in an active status for eighteen months. If an employee wishes to withdraw, modify, or in any other way change either of the two forms, he is free to do so.

"This career advancement opportunity is open to all NAL employees," Dr. Carrigan announced. "I can see, for example, technicians taking class work in anticipation of a future job advancement. The Career and Qualification Summary now gives some assurance that this desire for advancement is on file and will be considered. The plan also permits persons who for one reason or another are working in a job that is remote from their main career interest, to record appropriate information about their qualifications for the other position. It gives us an increased area of information about our employees' qualifications, and I look forward to the results."
