Clarence Bowling, Main Ring, was elected captain of the NAL team. He also led the team in scoring with 20 points in his first game. Bowling plays forward.


Second highest scorer for NAL was Bobby McNeal, Booster, who got 15 points. He also plays forward.

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
not be available so another site will be announced later. Following is the remaining schedule for NAL's team:

YOUTH CONFERENCE ON ATOM TOUR

The seventy or eighty high school students you may have observed playing volley ball near the Village Barn or touch football in the parking lot next to the Cafeteria on Friday, October 23rd, were not just here for fun and games! They were delegates to the 1970 National Youth Conference on the Atom, who, along with their teachers and several electric company representatives, had come to tour the Laboratory.

The National Youth Conference on the Atom is an annual event sponsored by the nation's investor-owned electric power industry and co-sponsored by the National Science Teachers Association. This year, almost 800 outstanding high school science students and their teachers from throughout the country gathered at the Sheraton-Chicago for three days of lectures by outstanding scientists and tours of the area's scientific installations.

Two busloads of visitors arrived at the NAL Village Barn promptly at 9:00 a.m. to be welcomed to the Laboratory by Donald R. Getz, Assistant Director, who said, "We are particularly pleased to have young men and women with such keen scientific interests tour the Laboratory. We know you will find it exciting and interesting, but you will discover as you tour that it is the people who work here that make it so interesting and exciting."

After viewing the film "Atom Smashers," Donald Young, Linac Section Head, answered many

questions asked by these future scientists; in fact, this portion of the program could probably have gone on for hours but, to stay on the tour schedule, it had to be cut short with the promise that there would be more time for questions as the tour progressed.

Max Palmer, Linac, and Lowell Klaisner, Booster, served as guides on the buses as the youths toured the Village and the Main Site, where the two groups walked through a portion of the Main Ring tunnel and then rode around the 4-mile circumference of the Main Accelerator.

The teachers on the tour returned to Chicago at 12:30 p.m. to attend a special teachers' symposium while the students and electric company representatives remained at the Laboratory for an afternoon program that started with an hour recreation period at the Barn.

At 1:30 p.m., the students broke up into smaller groups of about 16 or 18 people and engaged in some stimulating discussions with NAL staff members. Lee Teng's group met in the "Snake Pit" to discuss particle theory while Stanley Snowdon's students talked about the history of particle accelerators and high energy physics in general in the "Far Out Room," at the Curia.

The two discussion groups that met in the Barn were led by Dick Carrigan and Frank Nezrick of Experimental Facilities. "These kids were not just the run-of-the-mill science types," observed Dick. "They were outstanding students with an unusual interest in, and understanding of, science." His students discussed the research program at the National Accelerator Laboratory.

"What is an Experiment" was the topic of discussion in Frank Nezrick's seminar... beginning with the original concept of the theoretician to the actual testing of an experiment. In other words, "What it's all about" at NAL.

The tour of the Laboratory provided a most interesting meeting ground where the delegates to the National Youth Conference had an opportunity to expand their knowledge and awareness of the world of science by actively participating in these discussion groups. In a message to these students, President Nixon summed it up by saying, "The scientific challenges of the future will, in most part, be met by such creative young minds."
