NAL MACHINE SHOP TURNS OUT ANOTHER WINNER

Nine men in the NAL Machine Shop recently logged 925 hours turning out another of the tailor-made pieces of equipment which will bring further sophistication to the accelerator operation. Designed by the NAL's Technical Services section, the newly-installed beam scraper is located in the A17 section of the Main Ring. Design was based on parameters suggested by E. Malamud and R. Yamada of the Internal Target section, and B. McDaniel, at that time a member of NAL's Accelerator Section. The new device makes it possible to trap particles that have strayed slightly from the beam and to drop them at this point, leaving a cleaner, sharper beam to circulate, and lessening excessive radiation in the Main Ring tunnel. Operation of the scraper is monitored and controlled from the Main Control Room in the Cross Gallery.


The device includes two heavy steel blocks, which collect the particles and provide a dump. The experienced craftsmen of the Machine Shop were able to machine these massive blocks in only 80 hours. The project sometimes found work proceeding ahead of drawings in order to meet a very tight completion schedule.

Proof of the pudding came after installation in the Main Ring when the scraper functioned very well from the beginning and now provides useful and important tools for operation.


In addition to personnel shown in the photos, among those who participated in the project were Mark Kibilko, Accelerator Section; James Edwards, Technical Services

The Machine Shop crew is now deeply involved in the repair of the damaged transformer which furnishes power to the Main Ring. Working the long hours necessary to answer the demands given them, they are machining hundreds of teflon liners and the copper bus bars for the transformers. And there's no doubt that they'll be successful again!!

Listed below are eight aspects of improved coverage which went into effect on November 1. Employees with dependent coverage will be contacted soon about maternity benefit changes, Marofske advises, and benefit booklets and certificates of insurance covering the new benefit levels will be issued shortly.
