## AWARD FIVE URA-NAL SCHOLARSHIPS

M. Stanley Livingston

"For his outstanding contributions to the Nation's atomic energy program as a pioneer in accelerator technology; for his inventive imagination in collaboration with Ernest O. Lawrence in designing and building the world's first experimental cyclotrons; for his leadership in the design and construction of cyclotrons at Cornell University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, 1934-1946; for his creative contributions to the design and development of the Cosmotron at the Brookhaven National Laboratory, 1946-1948, and for his major role in the discovery of the alternating-gradient focusing principle; for his continuing contributions in the field of education and scientific research as professor of physics at MIT since 1954, Director of the Cambridge Electron Accelerator, 1956-1967, and Associate Director of the National Accelerator Laboratory at Batavia, Illinois."

So read a citation that was presented formally to Dr. Livingston -- along with a medal -- by U.S. Atomic Energy Commissioner Theos J. Thompson at a ceremonial dinner held in the NAL Village Thursday evening, June 4. The dinner was attended by members of the Universities Research Association, Inc., Board of Trustees, associates of Dr. Livingston at NAL, and other friends.

A week earlier, Glenn T. Seaborg, AEC chairman, had announced that Dr. Livingston had been named to receive the Atomic Energy Commission's Citation for his outstanding service in the nation's atomic energy program.

Dr. Livingston, associate director of NAL, will retire at the end of June to move with his wife, Lois, to a new home in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Mrs. Livingston has been a leader in the NAL Women's organization activities.

DR. WILSON SPEAKS TO NAL EMPLOYEES

On Thursday morning, June 4, at 9:30 a.m., NAL employees gathered in front of the Curia in the Village to listen to another in the continuing series of progress reports from Robert R. Wilson, the Laboratory director.

"Things are going very well...the happy note is that we are getting all of our efforts done on time...We did not have to go through that initial step of everyone settling down; we have all cooperated from the beginning," observed Dr. Wilson.

He added: "We have been awfully lucky...but I think that we deserve the good luck. We are now in our most active period...And we have one of our most exciting years ahead of us."

Dr. Wilson summarized some milestone dates that are coming up on the NAL calendar in the weeks ahead:

- (1) By August: about 25 percent of the Booster magnets will be in place.
- (2) In August: 66 MeV will be achieved in the first few sections of the Linac. This beam will be injected into whatever sections are completed in the Booster segment of the Accelerator system.
- (3) By October: About one-half of the Booster will be completed so that a beam then can be bent around this much of the Booster, through the Transfer Hall (now almost finished) into whatever is finished of the Main Ring (about one-sixth should be completed).

"We expect to have a 200 MeV beam out of the Linac by late winter, and we still feel that it is possible to have at least 200 BeV in July, 1971," Dr. Wilson said.
