



#### NAL RADIO AMATEURS TO PARTICIPATE IN FIELD DAY

Early Saturday morning, June 26th, the field across from Site #55 on Eola Road, will begin to be transformed into a temporary communications center manned by about 12 NAL Amateur radio operators. They will be participating in a nationwide contest to practice operation under simulated emergency conditions. "Field Day" is an annual event in which radio amateurs all over the United States, its possessions and Canada compete for a 24-hour period exchanging messages and making as many contacts as possible during this time period. Scoring is based on the number of contacts made with a multiplier given for stations operating with low power, below 200 watts, and using emergency electrical power such as a generator.

NAL's "hams" will begin operation between 1:00 and 4:00 p.m. Saturday with five stations running simultaneously using voice as well as continuous wave (Morse Code) transmissions. Operators for the weekend event include Joe Fisher, Bob Hodge, Rich Mirdas, Jim Schluchter, Ted Ulijasz, Greg Urban and Les Wahl from Accelerator Operations, John Brockmeyer from Beam Transfer, Greg Chartrand from Experimental Facilities, Bill Lord and Jim Snow from Meson Lab, and Fred Sarver and Lin Winterowd from Radio Frequency.

This will be the first real group activity attempted by radio amateurs at NAL. Soon after Field Day, efforts will begin towards forming an Amateur Radio Club. Once established, one of the first endeavors of this club will be to hold classes for those interested in becoming radio amateurs. Anyone who would like to see ham operators in action is invited to come out Sunday before 1:00 p.m. to watch the Field Day operations.
