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OPEN HOUSE BRINGS 13,000 VISITORS TO FERMILAB

More than 13,000 people visited the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory during the Open House on Sunday afternoon, June 23rd. A steady stream of visitors began arriving shortly before 1 p.m. and continued until the last bus unloaded about 7 p.m. Employees and experimenters, with enthusiastic support from a group of young energetic summer helpers, explained, answered questions, and assisted the thousands of FermiLab neighbors -- from babes in arms to elderly men and women -- who came to see the Laboratory. It appeared that many of the guests have been curious for some time about the buildings and research being carried out on the 6,800 acres that used to be, until six years ago, farms and the Village of Weston, Illinois. At the end of their visit they were in agreement that an interesting and beautiful facility had grown in their midst, but many still seemed mystified by some of the complexities of high energy physics.

The tour began for most of the visitors with a short slide presentation about the FermiLab, prepared and narrated by Frank Cole, Accelerator Division, who also served as chairman of the Organizing Committee for the Open House. The 800 seats of the Auditorium were filled every half hour for the slide show. Fred Mills and Phil Livdahl, Accelerator Division, served as hosts and answered questions for guests at this point. After the slides, a short walk took the tourists on to the Cockcroft-Walton, the Linac gallery, the Main Control Room, and a display of the magnets found in the accelerator system. An operating model of a superconducting magnet was on display, demonstrating the presence of the magnetic field by suspending a bundle of paper clips in mid-air. Staff members of the Accelerator Division spoke about the facilities at several points on the route. Boarding busses at the Booster Pond, guests and their guides went to the D-3 service building on the Main Ring, walked down to the Main Ring tunnel, some 20 feet below the ground, and then through this section of the tunnel moving upstream along the normal proton trajectory in the accelerator and up again at service building D-2. There, they reboarded the busses to be driven past the experimental areas, the Scottish Highland cattle and the buffalo. A stop was also made at one of the experimental areas.

A brisk wind all during the pleasant, cool, sunny afternoon of the Open House blew the haze off the Chicago Loop, leaving the Chicago skyline clearly visible to guests as they emerged from the elevators on the 15th floor of the Central Laboratory Building. This overview gives a panorama of the area surrounding the Laboratory from a perspective available nowhere else in the suburbs. The visitors' surprise and interest at the scene were evident, as they moved from one to another of all four sides of the FermiLab vantage point. A glass of lemonade and a short rest in the cafeteria and the atrium wound up the stay for most people.

The large attendance was gratifying to everyone at the FermiLab who has looked forward for several years to the day when their Laboratory could be displayed to friends, neighbors, and fellow citizens.

Monday, Frank Cole expressed his appreciation to those FermiLab people who participated in
