SEPTEMBER ACTIVITIES AT FERMILAB

A wide variety of activities comes to Fermilab during September as the summer season ends and the prospect of Indian summer weather means some pleasant days ahead. While over 100 Fermilab families harvest the fruits and vegetables in their on-site gardens, others are playing in the tennis tournament, and some exciting events are just ahead.

Teams are forming for the Canoe Race on Saturday, September 28. Starting at 11 a.m., the canoeists will enter the Main Ring ponds at the A sector and try for the best time record as they portage fifteen dikes and end at the F sector. The race is open to employees and visiting experimenters. Members of the Fermilab Radio Club will assist by providing communication on the race route. The Fermilab Chess Club will open its fall season with a Swiss Style tournament that begins Wednesday, September 25. According to Howie Pfeffer, Chess Club president, in this tournament, everyone plays five games, each game against a player with a similar record in the tournament up to that point; one round is played per week. The tournament matches will be played in the Central Laboratory cafeteria at 6 p.m. on Wednesdays or whenever tournament opponents agree to meet. Fermilab Chess Club play is open to anyone who likes to play chess. Clocks and chess sets will be supplied for tournament play. Fermilab's Auditorium Art Series opens its fall season on Friday, September 20, at 8:30 p.m. with an evening of mime entertainment starring T. Daniel. Mime is described as the art of non-verbal communication in which the artist, by body motions, depicts dramatic life situations for the audience. T. Daniel performed as a magician in his childhood and early adulthood. While a student at Illinois State University (ISU), he performed with the Gamma Phi Circus, adding tightrope walking and unicycling to his performance style. In 1969, after

finishing his B.S. and graduate work in theater at I.S.U., he became one of the first students of the famed Marcel Marceau in Marceau's school in Paris. Since 1971, Daniel has performed across the U.S. in his own show, combining the techniques of his versatile background. His Fermilab show includes a number of clever acts, such as "The Haunted House," "The Museum," and "The Clown."

Fermilab's Auditorium Art Series is open to all Fermilab people, their friends and families, and to the general public. Tickets for Series events are \$3.00 each for adults, \$1.50 for children. Tickets may be purchased at the Visitors Center, Central Laboratory, first floor west, or at the Auditorium door before the performance.

On Thursday, September 26, at 7:30 p.m., two renowned authorities on prairie landscapes will speak at the Fermilab. Dr. Robert Betz, Professor of Biology at Northeastern Illinois University, and Mr. Ray Schulenberg, Naturalist at the Morton Arboretum, will describe prairies in general, what the prairie was before settlement of the Midwestern U.S. and what has happened to prairie during and since settlement. Betz and Schulenberg will also describe the prairie restoration project now underway inside the Fermilab Main Ring. The meeting is also intended to provide information helpful to people who will participate in a seed harvest for the Fermilab prairie restoration project that will take place in the early weeks of October. Groups of people will be advised by Betz and Schulenberg, under the general direction of Tony Donaldson, Chairman of the Laboratory's Prairie Committee, to go to spots where remnants of authentic prairie plants are known to exist, such as in abandoned cemeteries, along railroad tracks, in the ten acres of the Morton Arboretum's restored prairie, in the Markham Prairie, and in other prairie areas. Many pounds of seeds will be collected, dried through the winter, and sown in the Fermilab Main Ring next spring. Anyone wishing to participate in this unique project may sign up at the meeting, or call Tony Donaldson, Ext. 4056, for further information. The project is open to the public. Serious students of biology may find the project educational and exciting.

The International Folk Dancing group continues to meet regularly in the Village Barn. Jim and Marilyn Griffin lead dances of many countries and cultures. There is no charge for this activity, just bring your dancing shoes to the next folk dancing evening.
