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PLAN TO CLOSE WILSON ROAD ON NAL SITE

More than a year ago, NAL announced its intention to close Wilson Road -- which runs East and West at the northern end of the 6,800-acre site -- to the general public, on October 1, 1970. That date is now approaching and the Laboratory is making plans to close this road.

Last week, the Laboratory sent letters to Mayor Brown, Batavia; Mayor Downs, West Chicago, and Mayor Stafford, Warrenville, advising them of the Laboratory's plans.

The Laboratory's intention is to operate Wilson Road on the same basis on which it operates Batavia Road -- namely, it will be closed to the public only from 8:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. At other hours, the road will be available at the driver's own risk.

Robert R. Wilson, NAL Director, notified the mayors of the adjoining suburbs that it now appears that NAL actually will have to cut Wilson Road to build NAL facilities, especially those associated with the Laboratory's experimental areas, within the next six months or by next Spring. The need to close Wilson Road more quickly than that has to do with vandalism on the site.

NAL recently has been suffering from vandalism along the roads through the site. The Laboratory has developed plans for use of many of the existing farm houses, barns and out-buildings which were purchased by the State of Illinois and presented to the U.S. Government through the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

The vandalism which has occurred represents a serious loss to the AEC and, therefore, to the general public; only last week a barn was burned down early one morning, and apparently the fire was set by vandals. NAL feels that it can only protect this property by closing Wilson Road on the NAL site.

It is the Laboratory's hope that by the time that Wilson Road is cut permanently the extension of Kirk Road and Averill-Barton Roads will be completed.

No matter what, however, it appears that there is now no way for Wilson Road to remain a public thoroughfare on any long-range basis.

Rudy Dorner, Site Management, is developing plans for guard services to establish plans for controlled access to the site after hours on both Batavia and Wilson Roads.

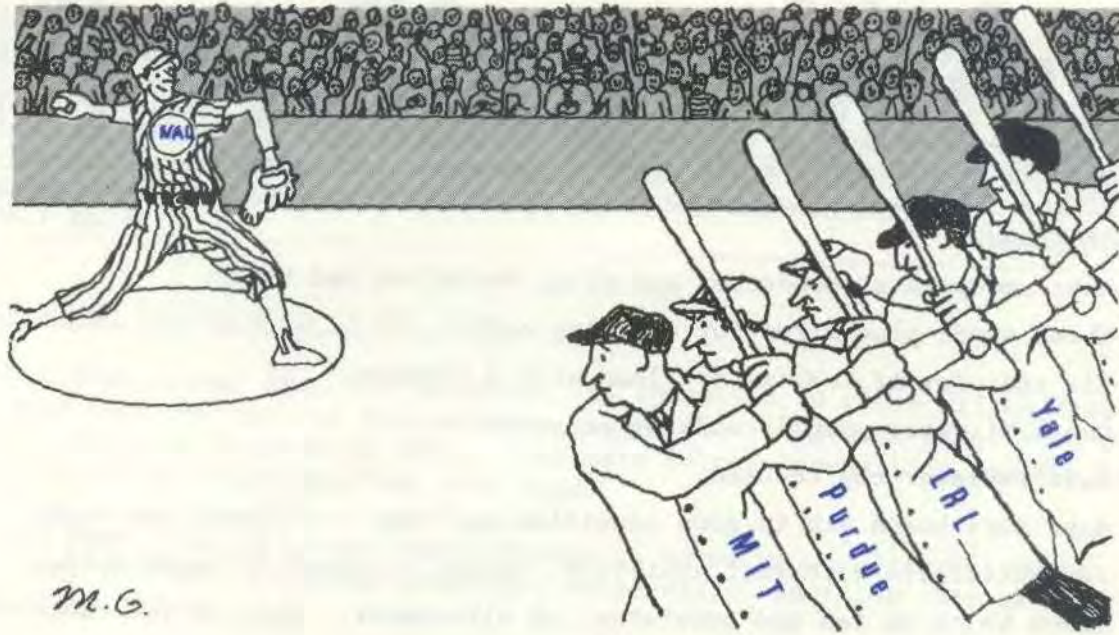

IT'S TIME TO WINTERIZE

Now that Labor Day has passed and thoughts of preparing for Winter again run through our minds, the NAL Maintenance Department has prepared a list of "tips on winter care for your car."

The list was developed by George Doyle on the basis of the causes of the emergency calls to which his staff members responded during the cold, snowy days of last Winter. It is not too early to get your car winterized, Doyle suggests. His list follows.

1. Have new points, condenser and plugs installed and timed.
2. Check spark plug wires for shorting out.
3. Fix radiator if leaking or clean with a cleaner.
4. Check if water pump is working properly.
5. Have radiator cap checked.
6. Make sure hoses are in good condition and that the clamps are tight.
7. Add antifreeze with rust inhibitor, tested to about 25 below zero.
8. Check belts on fan and generator, or alternator. This is the cause of about 25% of rundown batteries in winter use.
9. Battery, if old, or will not hold full charge overnight, it is time to invest in a new one.
10. Make sure battery connectors are clean and tight.
11. Have automatic choke checked. This is very important.
12. Have a carburetor check.
13. Install snow tires. Also, balance same.
14. Run your car for a few minutes with lights, heater and radio off before putting it away for the night. This will give your battery time to charge for a better start in the cold morning.
