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## BONANZA OF ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBITS

This week the Fermilab Central Laboratory building is the site of a remarkable set of exhibits. The bold "100 Years of Chicago Architecture" is beautifully mounted in the second floor lounge. In the atrium the display "Chicago's Architects" festoons the entrance. A fine collection of ceramics and pictures graces the auditorium foyer to honor Prairie Day in Illinois.

"100 Years of Chicago Architecture" has appeared in Chicago at the Museum of Contemporary Art and has toured Europe. The exhibit pays tribute to Chicago's architectural heritage - perhaps the most famous cultural treasure of the city. Chicago, at once the birthplace of the skyscraper and the prairie house of Wright has continued an architectural tradition right on up to the present day with the unique structural inventions that are the design foundation for the Hancock building and the Sears Tower. The full sweep of this treasure is captured by the photographers and models of the exhibit put together by Oswald Grube. The exhibit has been implemented with the help of the Graham Foundation for Advancement in Fine Arts, the Illinois Arts Council, the Illinois Bicentennial Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts. Jose Poces and his team from the model shop, B. McCaw, B. Huendorf, D. Wallace and V. Smith, put together the monumental display fixtures.

"Chicago's Architects" in the atrium, features another side of the city, concentrating on less well known structures from the past and present. Novel display methods are used including cutouts and stands arranged to put the pictures near eye level. Forty architects are represented. The exhibit was organized by Laurence O. Booth, Stuart Cohen, Stanley Tigerman and Benjamin Weese.

The second exhibit was intended as a statement against the first exhibit. The organizers refer to it as a "salon des refuses."

ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBITS (Continued)

The Prairie Day exhibit in the foyer highlights an intriguing set of pictures with a prairie flavor. Pen and ink and watercolor botanical drawings of wild plants by B. F. Lively, R. Simonds, and H. Tweedie catch the "quark" microcosms that go to make the macrocosm of the prairie. Vivid color photographs by A. Donaldson catch both the microcosm and the macrocosm. The natural earth character and colors of ceramics are used effectively to heighten the prairie feeling. The ceramics include pieces by several outstanding ceramists, among them Ruth Duckworth, perhaps the best known artist in Chicago today. Pieces are exhibited from Duckworth, K. Follette, G. Timock and P. Voulkos. The pieces have been loaned by the artists, Exhibit A in Evanston and from private collections. The exhibit was arranged by Jose Poces, Sandra Cox and Janice Roberts.

These exhibits are part of a continuing program to bring interesting displays to Fermilab. Already this program has included a number of excellent art shows and retrospective architectural presentations. Future programs are being planned by the committee in charge of exhibits as appointed by Dr. Wilson.

Good music, sung magnificently by Simon Estes, one of the world's outstanding young opera stars, will be heard in Fermilab Auditorium, Friday, October 8, at 8:30 p. m.

Mr. Estes is an internationally known artist whose credits include performances in leading roles with major companies all over the world. In a radio interview last week, Viorica Cortez, the Giulietta of this years Chicago Lyrics opening "Tales of Hoffman," announced that she will be singing opposite Mr. Estes in Bologna, Italy this year. Mr. Estes concert in Perugia last week required police help to control an over enthusiastic audience. It sounded more like what happens at a Rock Concert than what happens in a concert hall. Of special interest to Laboratory personnel is the performance by Mr. Estes of three songs composed by Rosamond Brenner, wife of Al Brenner.

The program includes Mozart concert arias and two opera arias, one from "Figaro" and one from "Don Giovanni"; Schubert Lieder, an aria by Ponchielli, some Bach, Purcell, several Spirituals and one piece from Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess." A very good program. The following month Mr. Estes will be performing in Orchestra Hall, the seats are a good deal more expensive.

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Tickets are \$3.00, all seats reserved, and are available in the Guest Office, C1-1W, 840-3440.

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NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK - OCTOBER 3-9

National Fire Prevention Week has been designated the week of October 3-9. This international observance of the need for fire safety came from the great Chicago Fire of 1871, with a regular observance of fire safety practices being recognized in 1911 by the Fire Marshals Association of North America.

A Fire Prevention Day was established and later extended to a full week by the National Fire Protection Association. Since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed during the week commemorating the anniversary of the Chicago Fire, October 9th, with the apt slogan this year, "LEARN NOT TO BURN."

During National Fire Prevention Week, the Fire Protection Department is offering all Laboratory employees basic training in the use of fire extinguishers. A request form has been mailed to all sections and it is hoped all employees will take advantage of this fire safety training. FACTS ABOUT FIRE

"Fire is costly," said Leonard Grimstead, Fermilab Fire Chief. "In 1974 there were about 3,000,000 fires in the United States, with an estimated dollar loss of nearly 4 billion dollars. However, a much more tragic figure was the fact that some 11,600 persons died by fire. Don't be a statistic -- LEARN NOT TO BURN!"
