THE CHANGING SCENE AT FERMILAB

(A photo tour of new developments here and there on the Fermilab site.)

...At a groundbreaking on October 6, (L-R) John McCook, E.L. Goldwasser, R.R. Wilson, and Leonard Grimstead signalled the start of construction of a new fire house, in the Phillips Farm area. The new station, to be in operation by the middle of 1977, brings the Fire Protection Department closer to the experimental areas as well as to the Central Laboratory. The Fire Department has been located at the end of Sauk Boulevard in the Village...

...Tunnel construction resembling the original construction at Fermilab can be seen now in the Proton Area. The new "Pion Area" is downstream of the existing Proton West experimental area. It will provide Fermilab with a major capability for pion and anti-proton beams at intensities and energies not available elsewhere, and with a superior electron beam. It will be possible here to study low cross sections which produce rare effects and particles such as the psi family...

...A large orange metal building is now being erected as the housing for the helium liquefying plant that will be part of the Energy Doubler operation. Located west of the Magnet Facility, the plant will utilize several pieces of equipment obtained from a surplus rocket installation in California. Other components are being refurbished and reconditioned so that the plant can come into operation in the fall of 1977. It will provide liquid helium for the Energy Doubler superconducting magnets...

THE COMMON COLD AND ITS COMPLICATIONS

A few hints from Dr. Charles Lang in the Medical Department:

During the months ahead, cold weather sets the stage for infections of the respiratory system. Long confinement indoors with decreased air-exchange in rooms permits easier transmission of viral and bacterial agents. In addition, rapid changes of temperature of the linings of the respiratory system and the stress of adaptation to such changes by the whole body seem to produce enough injury for the agents of infection to overcome natural defenses. Lack of rest and poor nutrition make the situation worse.

Once the infections exist--the running nose, the cough, the fever, the swollen glands, headache--all or several such symptoms may follow!

Treatment is symptomatic (using aspirin, decongestants, antihistamines), but early attention can minimize the episode! Such attention is to rest and to reduce the exposure to other irritants! (e.g. cold air, smoking, excessive physical exercise).

So then if you get a "cold"---treat yourself with rest, proper food, and lots of liquids (traditional citrus juices). If fever or other signs of a worsening condition develop (for example cough, stiff neck, expectoration), see a physician who will probably prescribe antibiotics for such complications if they are due to bacteria.
