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CENTRAL LABORATORY CAFETERIA SERVICE BEGINS

While the giant NAL accelerator whirled 5×10^{12} protons 200,000 miles every second around the 4-mile ring, the Laboratory last week took a major step toward providing some of the conveniences which help to create a proper climate for research at NAL. The opening of the permanent cafeteria at the Central Laboratory Building heralds the beginning of a social atmosphere that has been a major goal of Laboratory development. The 16-story structure was designed to be the nerve center of the Laboratory. During the construction period, the sense of "community" where ideas, plans, and personal exchanges combine into the morale that is sometimes the basis of new discoveries, has been eagerly awaited.

The cafeteria of the Central Laboratory building is located in the heart of the building on the southeast corner of the main entrance level. The serving area overlooks the main accelerator; the arched cooling water sprays are clearly visible here. The dining area lies between the atrium of the main lobby and the glass wall opening to the roof of the adjoining auditorium building. The present table arrangement seats 260 people, but this will expand as tables are added.

More than 250 customers showed up for the opening day at the new area after NAL Director Robert R. Wilson cut the official ribbon marking the start of service. The cafeteria staff put forth an all-out effort, seasoning the shiny new grills, cleansing and polishing the tables and bright yellow counters, producing ample evidence of the pleasant service now beginning.

It is possible to imagine that before long an atmosphere could emerge in the new surroundings much like that described by Victor Weisskopf in his book "Physics in the 20th Century," speaking of the famous Niels Bohr period of the Institute for Theoretical Physics in Copenhagen:

"Bohr found a new way of working. He did not work as an individual alone; he worked in collaboration with others...In lively discussions, in groups of two or more, the deepest problems of the structure of matter were brought to light. We see him, the greatest among his colleagues, acting, talking, living as an equal in a group of young, optimistic, jocular, enthusiastic people, approaching the deepest riddles of nature with a spirit of attack, a spirit of freedom from conventional bonds, and a spirit of joy that can hardly be described...Bohr and his men touched the nerve of the universe. The intellectual eye of man was opened to the inner workings of Nature that were a secret up to this point..."

Construction is reaching final stages in the main lobby of the NAL Central Laboratory Building. Workmen are planting a wide variety of trees and other greenery in the brick planters there. Looking up, crossways at both ends of the building catch the eye and carry the sweeping view up to the skylight at the top of the sixteen story lobby.

Permanent equipment is being installed in the food preparation area one floor below the Cafeteria serving lines. The end of 1973 will find the food service area close to their final state, hosting employees and visitors many hours a day. The Village Cafeteria will operate on a somewhat limited scale as the focus of the Laboratory shifts to the Central Laboratory area.

A variety of hot and cold sandwiches is available at lunch and dinner. Several entrees and accompaniments are offered on the hot line. Beverages, soft ice cream, and the popular scoop ice creams are served in the center island. Variations of these offerings will occur as completion of new facilities permits.

Frozen dinners and sandwiches are now available in the Cross Gallery during the owl shift. The Duty Assistant in the Control Room has a key to the Cross Gallery Kitchen where a microwave oven is installed for preparing these foods. Dinners vary somewhat in price and are typically around \$1.50 each.

IN MEMORIAM

LEO JOHN KOZIOL

Leo John Koziol, Instrument Welder in the NAL Machine Shop, died at Copley Memorial Hospital, Aurora, on Saturday, November 3, 1973, after a short illness. He resided in Sugar Grove, Illinois.

Leo was born in Chicago and attended technical training schools in Chicago and Hammond, Indiana. He started work at NAL in November, 1968, one of the first welders to do experimental work on the Main Ring magnets when the NAL welding shop was in the Experimental Boiling Water Reactor Building at the Argonne National Laboratory.

"Leo was always considered to be the 'old expert' of the welding department. When other welders came upon unfamiliar or difficult welding problems, Leo frequently had the answer," according to Bill Jones, head of the NAL Machine Shop.

Koziol is survived by his wife, Antoinette; a son, Leo B., and his wife and two grandsons of Livonia, Michigan; and a step-son, Richard Zych, who works in the NAL Receiving Department and who lives at home. Funeral services were held Tuesday, November 6, with burial at Lincoln Memorial Park, Aurora.
