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THE BUDGET OUTLOOK

President Nixon, in his Budget message Monday, requested Congress to include \$65,000,000 in the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's appropriation for Fiscal Year 1971 for further construction at NAL. In addition, \$9,400,000 in operating funds and \$7,550,000 in equipment funds for Fiscal 1971 for NAL also was requested by the President. The appropriation for Fiscal Year 1970, which ends next June 30, was \$70,000,000 for construction at NAL. If Congress approves President Nixon's request for FY 1971, it will mean that NAL has received a total of nearly \$155,000,000 in appropriations for construction since it was established.

AMERICAN PHYSICAL SOCIETY MEETING

A proposal that the American Institute of Physics might consider establishment of an office and staff which would collect and disseminate information about minority personnel and contractors to contribute to construction and to provide equipment and supplies for physics laboratories was made by Edwin L. Goldwasser, NAL deputy director, last week. Speaking at a news conference at the 1970 annual meeting of the APS at the Palmer House in Chicago, Dr. Goldwasser told how NAL is involving minority group members in the construction of NAL. Kennard Williams, NAL's head of Equal Employment Opportunity, also spoke. In addition, Dr. Goldwasser and Williams addressed a lengthy special evening session on Science and Society attended by hundreds of physicists from across the nation. In his speech, titled "The Scientist and the Inner City," Dr. Goldwasser said, in part:

"How can a scientist in a small research group make a contribution? Perhaps the most effective way for him to proceed is to use his prestige and influence in the university or industrial organization of which he is a part to establish and to enforce strong policies with respect to minority rights, education, training and employment opportunities.

"Scientists may wish, in addition, a more direct involvement---one which bears the stamp of their profession. It seems to me that this could be done through united action in their identity as a national community of scientists. As such, they could certainly support a sizeable investment of funds and effort. These could be used to establish a national office, and perhaps regional clearing houses, where expert advice could be available on matters of recruiting, training and employment of minority group members, on methods of purchasing and contracting in a manner that will stimulate minority group involvement in our industry and economy...."

On Wednesday, January 28, about 25 members of the American Physical Society and American Association of Physics Teachers toured the NAL Village and the Linear Accelerator Enclosure area. They were briefed by <u>Dr. Goldwasser</u> and <u>Donald Young</u>, Linac section chief. The group included several foreign delegates.

ANOTHER TAT CLASS

Kennard Williams, head of the Equal Employment Opportunity section at NAL, advises that he and his staff are recruiting young men for another Training and Technology Project class to be held at Oak Ridge, Tenn., starting in February. The new class---second of its type---will have about 10 members who will be trained in various skills for NAL such as drafting, mechanical technicians and electronic technicians. "We are attempting to select candidates from communities in the far western suburbs---Aurora, Wheaton, Maywood, La-Grange---in order to minimize relocation problems for these men when they return to the area after finishing their training," Williams explained.

Last year, NAL pioneered in the TAT effort when 24 young men took advantage of a new program which linked the efforts of two U.S. Atomic Energy Commission operations in training disadvantaged men. The program was supported through an inter-agency agreement between the AEC and the U.S. Department of Labor under the Manpower Development and Training Act. The men were trained for their new jobs at AEC facilities in Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

In general, the course consists of four hours of classes in science, mathematics, and related courses, and four hours of shop, five days a week. If the trainee has not received his high school diploma, he is urged to do so while in the TAT program.

Trainees are recruited through community organizations. The DUSAF innercity "Outreach" office has also assisted in finding motivated persons to take part in the program.

NAL NURSE REVIEWS SICK LEAVE RULES (By Dorothy Poll, R.N.)

Since there have been so many employees off ill recently, I thought it would be a good time to remind all personnel of the Laboratory's sick leave policies:

- 1. An employee absent for sickness for four days or longer must have a note from his doctor before he can return to work.
- 2. An employee who becomes ill at work and must go home should report to the Nurse before leaving. (Ext. 232 by phone; office at 24 Sauk.)
- 3. When an employee calls in ill and cannot come to work, his first day absent is taken off personal leave, unless he was sent home the previous day by the medical department, or unless he was admitted to a hospital the first day of illness. Subsequent days are charged to sick leave.
