DEVELOPMENT OF "ASPEN-EAST" BEGINS

Dick Utt and the NAL Construction group took advantage of the minimum day-off traffic Saturday, April 25, to move the house (shown in the photo below) from the former Hadley Farm on Eola Road to the expanding complex on the former Kuhn Farm, at the corner of Sauk Boulevard and Batavia Road in the NAL Village.

Known informally as "Aspen-East," the facilities are being prepared to help accommodate the NAL Summer Study June 22 to July 24th. The study will be attended by approximately 40 high energy physicists from universities and laboratories throughout the United States, Canada and Switzerland, as well as by NAL physicists.

The Hadley house will be joined by a 26-foot corridor to the Kuhn house, already on the corner location. Directly behind the houses is the newly-remodeled meeting hall, formerly the Kuhn Farm barn.



MOVING DAY.....

The move was done by the Belding Engineering Company of West Chicago which, according to Utt, has handled the majority of the more than 40 moving projects on the NAL site in the last two years. The Aspen-East facility will be in use for some time, as more and more scientists come from all over the world to participate in the NAL program.

THOSE NEW ADDRESSES ON THE NAL SITE



Last February, the Site Manager's office posted numbered signs in front of various farm buildings and other structures on the NAL site. A map detailing just where these buildings are located is being prepared under the direction of Rudy Dorner. A major reason for the signs is to provide address information for emergency situations -- in cases of fires, injuries, etc. -- so that the NAL Volunteer Fire Department and the Batavia and West Chicago fire departments easily can find the areas to which they are directed. The red and white signs look like this one, which has been placed at the former Leon Feldott farm, where the NAL buffalo now graze.

DUSAF FAMILY SON WINS SCIENCE FAIR AWARD

Nearly every day, NAL receives requests for information about its plans and programs from students across the entire academic spectrum -- from elementary grades to post-doctoral fellows.

Several months ago, such a request came from Michael Bulat, a sixth grade student at the Whittier school in suburban Downers Grove. He wanted to do an exhibit and a booklet on the NAL accelerator system.

It was a natural request. Michael's father, Chester, is a mechanical engineer with DUSAF, the architect-engineering joint venture firm concerned with conventional facilities on the NAL site. Mr. Bulat has been an employee of DUSAF for more than two years. He is a native of the DuPage county area.

Mrs. Bulat, who came to the United States from France as a "war bride" in 1945, has a hobby -- rock hunting -- which has taken the family to North Carolina and the Mississippi River banks. The family also gardens, having one plot at home and another at NAL. This year, they plan to raise a large quantity of sunflower seeds because they also are "bird watchers."

One of the biggest news items in the Bulat household in recent weeks was the news that Michael had been selected as the grand prize winner at the Whittier school science fair. In the photo above, he is seen showing his teacher, Mrs. Rosemary Crago, his booklet on NAL.

(Editor's Note: Michael named his booklet "The Weston Accelerator" although it is the hope of the Laboratory that it will be referred to around the world, in this construction period, as "The National Accelerator Laboratory." The village of Weston, of course, no longer exists.)

Said his teacher of Michael's work:

"Michael chose a subject that is very mature for a sixth-grader. He did a fine job of making it into an attractive, meaningful display."

Mrs. Elaine Reiman, informational services, Downers Grove public schools said:

"Young Michael had a very impressive exhibit and should be most pleased to be recognized for his accomplishment by your Laboratory."

The Downers Grove Reporter featured Michael in a story and a photograph. Recently, Michael was selected to take part in a workshop where students are permitted to develop special projects of their choosing and at their own pace. He is building an inter-com system.
