SECOND FERMILAB OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY JULY 20

Fermilab will again open its doors to the public at the Open House to be held Sunday, July 20, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.

About 200 employees will act as tour guides on two tour routes planned for the occasion. Frank Cole, Accelerator Division, is again serving as chairman of the Open House committee. John McCook, Associate Director for Administration, is general manager of the event.

The public is being asked to enter the Fermilab site from Butterfield Road at the Eola Road entrance and to park in an area at the intersection of Eola and Batavia Roads. Although the Wilson Road and Batavia Road entrances will be open to the public, traffic entering at these points will also be directed by the site patrol to the same public parking areas. Shuttle busses will run continuously from there to and from the Central Laboratory.

To keep the shuttle busses running without interruption, employees and visitors with vehicle stickers are asked to enter and to leave the Laboratory by the Pine Street entrance which will be restricted to vehicles with Fermilab stickers. These cars should park in the regular parking areas near the Central Laboratory. Employees entering at Wilson and Batavia Roads must park in the public parking lot and use the shuttle bus. No private cars will be allowed on the bus tour routes.

The first tour route for the Open House includes the Central Laboratory, the Linac and Cross Galleries, and a portion of the Main Ring tunnel. After leaving the Main Ring tunnel, guests may take a bus tour of the experimental areas. This tour will begin on the Main Ring Road at the F-4 sector. The only stop will be at the Meson Detector Building. Guests may walk through the building to see the 16 high energy physics experiments now in place there. The bus route continues around the Neutrino Area and the Proton Area, returning to the parking areas by Batavia Road. Employees parked near the Central Laboratory should return there by taking the shuttle bus from the parking lot.

A special map with explanations of 13 points of interest will be given to each guest on arrival. A small take-home pamphlet, briefly explaining the work and purpose of Fermilab, will be distributed from the reception area in the Central Laboratory. A vendor will sell light refreshments in the parking area. There will be no service in the cafeteria.

BOLSHOI BALLET VISITS FERMILAB

Nineteen members of the famed Bolshoi Ballet visited Fermilab Thursday, July 10 for a tour of the Laboratory. Nine of the artists performed four short demonstrations at a noon-hour seminar for Fermilab people.

The Ballet, on its eighth tour of the United States since 1956, has played to capacity audiences at every performance in the United States. The Ballet appeared in Chicago for three performances last week. Celebrating its 200th anniversary in 1976, the Bolshoi Theater, the home of the Ballet, is considered the cultural center of Moscow.

The guests were welcomed by Robert R. Wilson, Director of the Laboratory, for what he called an artist-to-artist visit. "Indeed the science of the atom which we study here is more of an art than a science," he said.

The distinguished troupe was invited to visit Fermilab by the more than a dozen Soviet scientists now working at Fermilab. "We hope this will be the first of many such presentations of our arts," the leader of Soviet physicists' group, Dr. Serge Mukhin, commented, "because we want not only to work for science but also for cultural exchanges between our countries."

Semen Kaufman, who acted as master of ceremonies for the Bolshoi, told the audience, "The Bolshoi is always looking for new forms and structures of expression. We think the arts should reflect contemporary human beings." The visitors played to a packed house in the Fermilab auditorium.

Following their performance, the Soviet visitors toured the Fermilab accelerator before returning to Chicago.

UNITED BUYING SERVICE FROM YOUR CREDIT UNION

As a member of the Argonne Credit Union, you are eligible to use United Buying Service to get good prices on cars or major appliances. United Buying Service is a cooperative-discount plan which services large groups of customers such as Credit Union members. To use United Buying Service, you first pick out the model of the product you want to buy. Then contact the Service to get a purchase certificate. They will refer you to a dealer who has, for example, agreed to sell cars at \$100 over his cost (including options, dealer preparations, freight, etc.). Your Credit Union has books from the United Buying Service which list the dealer "cost" for the basic car and the cost of each option. You know before you reach the showroom exactly what the dealer will charge, by stopping at the Credit Union and using the available books.

Certain models have been in short supply for the '75 model year. These cars cannot be sold under these terms. You will be told when you call the Buying Service whether the car you want falls into this category. However, you can be assured of getting any model you wish for \$100 over cost if you order a '76 model before any shortages develop for that year. Our price books for the '76 models will be available about the same time the new cars are announced.

A NOTE OF CAUTION: Just getting a good price on the car does not mean you are getting the best deal. Check at the Credit Union to determine a fair price on your trade-in. Using the Buying Service does not in any way obligate you to use dealer financing. Remember that at 9%, you can't beat your Credit Union's new car loans.
