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TREES - A BOUNTIFUL CROP GROWS TO ENHANCE THE SITE

Across an expanse of more than 30 acres and reaching majestically outward and upward, thousands of young trees and seedlings grow, waiting patiently their turn to make Fermilab a more beautiful place for employees and users to work.

One of the many projects of Site Services and Roads and Grounds, this gesture of providing tender loving care for more than 1,100 young trees and 4,750 seedlings not only will enhance the site in the decades ahead but also will save the Laboratory money because the trees will be home-grown. The young trees - many of them planted the last two years and this spring, but some as much as six or seven years ago - will be replanted around the site when they are mature enough for future Arbor Days and for other landscape projects.

"The tree nursery is part of a comprehensive land management effort intended to improve and beautify our landscape," explained John Paulk, head of Site Services.

This tree nursery is on the east side of Eola Road across from Site 55. Twenty-seven varieties of young trees are now growing there. Many of them are expected to be ready for transplanting to permanent homes in three or four years. The seedlings, thriving on a patch just south of the larger trees, should be sturdy enough in seven or eight years, according to Bob Hall, the manager responsible for their expert care.

The seedlings and the number of them include black walnut (750), hickory (500), ash (500), pin oak (250), red oak (250), red pine (500), white pine (500), red twig dogwood (500), Washington hawthorn (500) and honeysuckle (500).

Here's a list of the larger trees: Colorado spruce, amur maple, Clump River birch, Ohio buckeye, ginkgo biloba, shade-master locust, sunburst locust, "Green-spire" linden, crimson king maple, royal

red maple, "Summer Shade" maple, corkscrew willow, "niobe" weeping willow, "Red Sunset" maple, "Green Mountain" sugar maple, regular sugar maple, dwarf Jonathon apple, dwarf McIntosh apple, dwarf red delicious apple, dwarf winesap apple, dwarf golden delicious apple, Maxine pear, white angel flowering crab, Van Esteltine flowering crab, Viburnum, Acer Rubrum red maple and pin oak.

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REMINDER ABOUT NEW CAFETERIA HOURS





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
FALL HOUSING REQUESTS
