## CHINESE SHARE TRADITIONAL THANKSGIVING



During the week of November 27 a delegation from the People's Republic of China visited Fermilab. The previous week this group had negotiated the Agreement for 1984 between the Academia Sinica of the PRC (the China equivalent of the National Academy of Science) and the Department of Energy for collaborative accelerator projects. These projects are intended to assist the Institute of High Energy Physics in Beijing, China, to build a  $2.8 \times 2.8$  GeV  $e^+e^-$  collider called the Beijing Electron Positron Collider (BEPC). The BEPC is now in the final design stage and has received approval and identification as a "key project" which assures its funding and priority. Construction will begin in 1985 and be completed by 1988.

Members of this group included several persons from the Institute who are not strangers to Fermilab. They had previously

spent time here working on the design of a 50-GeV proton synchrotron which has since been indefinitely deferred. The rest of the delegation consisted of persons from Academia Sinica. The leader of the delegation was Madam Gu Yu, who was formerly the Head of Planning and is now a principal advisor to Academia Sinica. Others of the delegation included Zhang Houying, Zhu Hongyuan, Xie Jialin, Ye Minghan, Fang Fhouxian, Liu Huaizu, Zhao Wenyan, Hou Rucheng, Li Shubao, and Chen Sen Yu.

During their week at Fermilab, Lee Teng of the Accelerator Division served as their principal host, and Sandra Cox of the Directorate was in charge of local arrangements.

The delegation toured the accelerator and experimental areas as well as the  
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magnet facility. Since they are in the process of starting to build components for their new storage ring they exhibited great interest in the assembly processes of magnets now being built for the antiproton source project. In addition, the group



toured industries in the area and had opportunities to meet and talk to native Chinese persons who now live in the Chicago area.



A highlight of the stay at Fermilab was the Thanksgiving dinner which was served to the entire delegation by the Eldon Gould family at their farm near Maple Park. This experience gave the Chinese delegation a first-hand view of the American tradition of Thanksgiving and also of the life on a working Illinois farm. The Gould farm is a highly sophisticated hog farm which uses the most scientific methods of adjusting the feeding and reproduction cycles of the animals by carefully monitoring performance of the various strains using computerized analyses.




The dinner included ham which had been raised on the farm as one of the Gould boy's 4H project as well as turkey and the traditional Thanksgiving menu.

The Laboratory is indebted to the Gould family for opening their home for this occasion in order that the delegation could experience the warm hospitality of an Illinois family gathering.

## PHYSICIST AWARDED PRIZE

Taiji Yamanouchi, Fermilab Assistant Director and Head of the Program Planning Office, was selected to receive the 1983 Nishina Memorial Prize at a ceremony held in Tokyo on December 6. This prize is given to Japanese physicists who have performed distinguished work in the field of atomic and nuclear physics. Dr. Yamanouchi was awarded the prize for his accomplishments in high-energy physics research, including his contribution to the discovery of the upsilon particle in Fermilab experiment E-288.

# NEW YORK VOCAL ARTS ENSEMBLE PERFORMS JAN. 14

Enjoy a "miraculous blend of first class voices and sensitive keyboard virtuosity" on Saturday, January 14, 1984, when the New York Vocal Arts Ensemble performs at 8 p.m. in Ramsey Auditorium. This "elegant and high-spirited" quartet, accompanied by pianist Raymond Beegle, will present "An Opera Evening" of arias, duets, trios, and quartets from the grandest of the operatic repertoire.

The selections in the program are taken from Beethoven's mighty "Fidelio," Verdi's poignant "Rigoletto," Gounod's dramatic "Faust," Puccini's tender "La Boheme," Rossini's riotous "Barber of Seville," and Strauss' sparkling "Die Fledermaus." The music of these most popular operas combine to capture the glamour of a dozen nights in the world's great lyric theatres. Of the Ensemble, critics rave that the performers' "irresistible charm creates an enchanted evening."

The New York Vocal Arts Ensemble was established twelve years ago by the group's pianist and Artistic Director, Raymond Beegle. The ensemble has six recordings to its credit, and, in 1980, was awarded first prize in the Geneva International Music Competition. Aside from their annual season at New York's Lincoln Center, the group has performed frequently in Europe, South America, and across the United States.

Plan to attend this evening of opera with the New York Vocal Arts Ensemble. Admission is \$5, and tickets are available at the Information Desk in the atrium of Wilson Hall, ext. 3353. Phone reservations are held for five days, but due to ticket demand, those reservations not paid for within five working days will be released for sale.


## JEFFRIES SEEKS RIDE TO FERMILAB

# NEW PROCEDURE SPEEDS ELEVATOR PASSENGER RELEASE

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A new system for release of persons stuck in a Wilson Hall elevator has recently been installed. When a call is received by the Communications Center operator that an elevator is stuck, a code is issued to call the Fire Department for release of the passengers. At this time, the operator will turn off the power to the stuck elevator (this will not turn off the

car lighting). When the Fire Department arrives, the adjoining car will be called to atrium level for Fire Department use. When this happens, those persons riding the working elevator will notice a fire call light in the lower right-hand corner of the button panel, or they can call on the car phone for information. The car is programmed to operate correctly in this mode. Once the Fire Department has reached the floor where the stuck elevator is located, they will proceed to remove the passengers. (This can be done immediately since the power was shut off by the operator when they first received the call.) This new procedure will speed the release of passengers.

Do not attempt to get out of a stalled elevator yourself. Wait for help. You could prolong rescue time and place yourself in danger.
